




From my experiences her unique style, flexibility, and downhome fun ensure a romping good time and leave the people she meets with a positive message.

Dear Wyoming Arts Council,

I wholeheartedly recommend renewing Miss V, the Gypsy Cowbelle as a Wyoming Arts Council (WAC) Roster Artist.

Miss V gave a performance at the Laramie County Library on September 6, 2013 to an audience of 90 people of all ages to help us open the *America's Music* project (an exclusive film and discussion series through the American Library Association, the Tribeca Film Institute and the National Endowment for the Humanities). Those who attended the concert thoroughly enjoyed Miss V's mix of sing-along favorites and her original storytelling songs. She told background stories about her songs, and had the audience engaged with her charismatic personality. After the concert she gave individual attention to those who asked her questions and just wanted to talk with her. She also sought feedback from me as to how the performance went and how she could improve.

The next morning Miss V gave a Homespun Instruments Workshop to 20+ children and their parents, which was a big hit with everyone. Children learned how to play music on buckets and other items that are easily found around the house, and Miss V engaged them with enthusiasm and patience.

Both of Miss V's performances were made possible with funding from a WAC grant written by Carrie Lucas, Assistant Manager, Youth & Outreach Services, who worked with me to coordinate and implement Miss V's performance and workshop.

Miss V also handcrafts banjoes out of wooden planks, and exhibited one that has traveled the country with her. More than 50,000 people have visited the library while her banjo has been on exhibit.

Having coordinated dozens of presenters for library events, I consider Miss V one of the best that I have worked with. She was prompt, professional, communicative, and as many other library staff members stated, delightful to work with. Carrie is working with her again to schedule future events. This fact alone indicates Miss V's appeal to the general public the library serves and her professionalism.
